

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Little Chefs, Big Benefits:

Cooking with Children

f you're looking for a great learning opportunity for your children, step no further than your kitchen. It's the perfect setting for kids to learn about nutrition, math, science, as well as to develop their arm and hand muscles and reading skills. Spending time together in the kitchen can be fun for the whole family and is instrumental in forming healthy eating habits. Here are some tips to keep the experience fun, educational, and safe.

Plan:

A little planning goes a long way when cooking with your children. Mixing in a tiny chef (or two or three) won't add too much time to your regular routine if you plan your menu ahead of time, buy all the necessary ingredients, and keep your recipes handy. In fact, if you dare, it can be worthwhile to let your kids take an active

role in the meal planning and grocery shopping process because they will be more willing to try new foods if they have a hand in choosing them.

Clean:

The first rule when preparing to cook is: Wash your hands. This rule goes for big and small chefs alike. Anyone with long hair should fasten it back in a ponytail, and sleeves should be rolled up. By taking measures to keep things sanitary, you greatly reduce the chances of food-borne illness. Your kids will find a clean working environment more conducive to creativity in the kitchen.

Eat:

A light pre-dinner snack can take the edge off hunger and help create a more relaxed atmosphere. So go ahead and pull out some carrot sticks, string cheese, or apple slices. If neither you nor your kids are ravenous, the experience will be more pleasant.

Prepare:

Set up a working station for your tiny helpers, or even bring a sturdy stool or chair (that they can safely balance on) so they can reach the counter. Make sure to remove any potentially dangerous items from their reach, such as cooking shears and knives. Read the recipe with your child, and then set out the necessary mixing bowls, spoons, and ingredients.

Communicate:

Explain to your little ones the importance of staying away from a hot stove. One quick slip in this area could

be hazardous to your child's health, such as third-degree burns resulting from a pot of boiling water. For this reason, it's essential that he understand this rule is set in stone.

Supervise:

Never leave your child unattended in the kitchen; your supervision is necessary at all times. It's especially important to teach your kids the importance of following steps to ensure food safety. Keep raw and cooked foods separate. Don't allow them

to sample cookie dough or anything else containing raw eggs. Wipe up spills as they happen. If any taste testing occurs, be sure to place the licked spoon in the sink instead of back in the bowl.

Reminder for Parents:

As you know, little people tend to be messy, and cooking with them is no exception. Patience is a requirement when cooking with children. While the cooking process becomes messier and longer when it involves kids, it provides you with the opportunity to share a fun learning experience with your little ones. So try to relax and enjoy some quality time with your child...even if it is in the kitchen.

Having taken these steps, you are ready to begin. Check the chart for age-appropriate tasks to assign to your children, and start having some fun! Bon Appétit!





Age-appropriate Kitchen Activities Chart

When cooking with children, it's important to keep their physical limitations in mind so that neither they nor you become frustrated or overwhelmed. Use the following guidelines for your tiny chef's cooking tasks, but base your decisions on each individual child's abilities.

2-year-olds

- Wash fruits and vegetables
- Tear lettuce
- Break cauliflower, broccoli, and asparagus spears
- Stir ingredients in mixing bowl (with your assistance)
- Carry napkins and spoons to table
- Dip foods
- Wipe table and counter (Although you will probably want to do it again when your little one is not looking).

3-year-olds

- Everything in the previous list.
- Pour (already measured) ingredients
- Mix ingredients
- Knead dough
- Spread butter or other spreads
- Throw away trash
- Knead dough
- Press cookie cutters

4-year-olds

- Everything in the previous lists
- Set the table
- Cut herbs with child scissors
- Mash foods
- Peel fruits, vegetables, or hardboiled eggs
- Juice citrus fruits
- Cut soft foods with a plastic knife

5-year-olds

- Everything in the previous lists
- Clear the table after meals
- Crack eggs
- Measure ingredients
- Use eggbeater

HOMEMADE SOFT PRETZELS

This month's recipe for Homemade Soft Pretzels offers tasks for little hands at every turn: measuring, stirring, kneading, rolling, and shaping. Many recipes for homemade pretzels instruct cooks to dip the dough into a baking sodawater bath to achieve that trademark pretzel shine. My finished pretzels get their finish from a more



child-triendly (and easier) egg glaze. Have your kids wash their hands, roll up their sleeves, and then roll out some pretzels. As for me, I think I'll call my mom and see if I can finagle another meal of chicken-and-dumplings and pumpkin pie out of her.

Judging from pictorial evidence, I joined my mom in the kitchen at a young age and never really left. All my life, I have cooked and baked for the people I love: cookies for my family, cream cheese-stuffed crescent rolls for my choir friends the mornings we had early rehearsals before school, cheese manicotti for those same friends when they came to our house for dinner. My two daughters enthusiastically consume the fruits of my culinary labors, and when I am patient enough to heed the advice in this month's article "Little Chefs, Big Benefits" —"try to relax and enjoy some quality time with your child... even if it is in the kitchen"—my girls also like helping me cook. I don't think they've inherited my innate love for cooking, but on the other hand, they love things I abhor (gym class comes to mind). Since I think everyone can learn to cook whether or not they love to cook, my ongoing goal is to teach my daughters at least a few basic recipes so they, too, can feed and nurture the people they love.

Homemade Soft Pretzels

- 2 packets active dry yeast
- 1 ½ cups warm (not hot) water
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup white whole-wheat flour (preferably King Arthur
- brand
- 3 cups all-purpose white flour
- 1 egg, beaten
- Salt for sprinkling tops of pretzels, optional
- Nonstick cooking spray

Preheat oven to 425°. Line two baking sheets with parchment paper or coat with nonstick cooking spray. In a large bowl, dissolve the yeast in the warm water. If you have a candy or instant –read thermometer, you can check the temperature of the water before you use it: it should be between 100° and 110° degrees. **If your water is too hot, it will kill your yeast.** This is not good. Let the water/yeast mixture stand for a few minutes to activate. After about 5 minutes, check the mixture; it should be foamy and bubbly on the surface. If it isn't, throw it out and start over, being certain your water is warm but not hot. If your yeast mixture does not look "lively," your resulting pretzels will have the texture of hockey pucks...again, not good.

Once your yeast/water mixture is ready, stir in the sugar and salt, then gradually mix in the flours. The mixture will become very stiff and hard to stir (this is where your kids' muscles come in!). Once the flours are incorporated, turn the mixture out onto a lightly floured work surface, and knead the dough vigorously for about 10 minutes, until smooth and elastic.

Divide the dough into 16 portions and roll each into a rope on the counter. Form into a pretzel shape (or any other shape you like...snails and letters are popular at our house) and place on the prepared cookie sheets. Using a pastry brush, basting brush, or (clean!) paint brush, coat the top of each pretzel with some of the beaten egg. Sprinkle with salt if desired. Bake the pretzels at 425° for 12 to 15 minutes, or until golden brown. Serve warm (at our house, we like them dipped in mustard or pizza sauce). Makes 16 pretzels.

You may have heard the term CSA in discussions about supporting local farms and eating fresh, whole foods. CSA stands for Community Supported Agriculture, which is basically a share or membership that a family buys directly through a farm, then receives a weekly portion of the produce that is harvested. CSAs have grown in popularity, and there are now many local farms offering memberships. Buying a share is also a great way to reduce your carbon footprint by avoiding food that's traveled hundreds if not thousands of miles to get to you. In addition, CSAs save money. While most programs require at least a 50% down payment at the beginning of the growing season, if not payment in full, generally the cost is less than you'd spend on grocery store produce.

Choosing the right CSA is fairly simple, but there are a few tips to help you choose the one that's right for your family and ensure you get the most out of your share.

- Consider the season and commitment. Most CSAs have similar growing seasons, running from early June through October. However, some offer extended seasons and shorter 8 week summer seasons, making it easy for you to choose the commitment that's right for you. Some farms ask members to work a certain number of hours on the farm, so knowing what the requirements are will help you plan accordingly.
- Find out what type of produce is generally offered. It's fun to get new and interesting vegetables, but if you have a family of picky eaters, you may opt for a farm with more offerings closer to their tastes. Some farms allow their customers to select the food they'd like in their weekly box, but most offer standard produce from that week's harvest, and generally you'll get a wide variety of vegetables. Keep in mind that often there will not be much fruit in the weekly box, so talking with the farmer ahead of time to determine the type of produce you can expect will help you make an informed choice and know what to plan to pick up elsewhere.

- Get an idea of how much food you'll be receiving each week. Often CSAs offer shares meant for a family of four, but if you're light eaters, you may not use all the produce in a week. Splitting your CSA share with a neighbor or friend can be an ideal way to get the right amount of food for your family and share in the cost.
- **Get a seasonal cookbook.** You may be getting new and different vegetables than you may normally eat, so it can be helpful to find a good seasonal cookbook to learn about cooking with things like garlic scapes and kohlrabi. Many farms provide recipes with their weekly produce boxes, and sometimes even offer cooking demonstrations. Trying new recipes is a fun way to involve children in using the CSA offerings.
- Determine how the farm handles food pick-ups. Many have times available to pick up your produce at a local farmer's market, or at the farm directly. Since you'll be picking up your box weekly, finding an ideal location with times that fit your schedule will make it more convenient and easy to get your food. If you're going to be out of town or on vacation, ask a friend or neighbor to pick up the produce for you so it doesn't go to waste.
- Ask the farmer questions. It's a good idea to find out how
 the food is grown, and what methods are used for pest
 control. It's also helpful to ask for a couple references to find
 out how others like the way the CSA operates.

There are several local farms that offer CSA shares. The website www.localharvest.org/csa has a search option available to find CSAs in your area. Once you select the program that's right for your family, you can feel good knowing you're supporting local agriculture and keeping your money in the community. Best of all, you'll know how your food is grown and exactly where it's coming from!

MOMS WANT THE GIFT OF A HEALTHY FAMILY

Il moms want their growing families to be as healthy as possible, and regular physical exercise and good nutrition are vital. Does your family's health need a slight tune up? Here are some ideas to discuss.

Annual Well Child Check

Attend your child's well child check with a list of questions. Since your child's pediatrician has so many recommendations to discuss, don't assume she will remember everything. "Parents need to know that docs can't get everything every time so any concern you have or anticipatory guidance you want, you should not hesitate to ask for," says Deborah Gilboa, MD.

During the visit, let your child answer as many of the doctor's questions as possible. Bite your tongue if you



have to and don't be afraid of silence. It's easy to want to speak for your child, but allowing him to think about the question and answer it promotes self confidence in your child and rapport with the doctor. Also, your child's answer may be different than what you expect. You can fill in any missing information if necessary.

Talk to your doctor about any concerns you have about your child even if you're uncomfortable. If your child won't take medicines or is leaving the house without your permission, etc. "Without this information the doc cannot help you help your child. The doctor may be aware of resources in your community that you are not," says Gilboa.

Check to see if you can email health concerns to your doctor's office before the visit. An email can be an opportunity to present to the doctor about an issue you don't want to address in front of the child. With some children, a doctor can address harder subjects with your child like overweight or stress issues. Older children view doctor advice differently than their parents input.

Keep Talking

According to Dr. Lisa Santora, CMO for the Beach Cities Health District, substance abuse is an overlooked health concern or one that is not addressed in the home. Kids are exposed to smoking and alcohol use in the home, on television or out in public. "Yet parents often do not feel comfortable or prepared to talk to their children about the risks of these behaviors," says Santora. Yet, the average age for a child to try alcohol is eleven years old.

If you haven't started talking about this with your children, start by asking questions when you see someone smoking or drinking on television. Ask your kids about what they know and why is it unhealthy? Keep calm and a non-judgmental tone to your voice. Provide your children a safe haven to talk to you and ask any questions that they may have.

Exercise

The benefits of daily exercise include increased relaxation, better sleep and a more positive mood for starters.

Make an exercise plan and include the



entire family.
A simple
chart can
help kids
set realistic
goals and
lets their

excitement grow as they see progress. If the weather is poor, swimming or exercise DVDs help kids stay moving. Also check with your local parks and recreation department for more exercise options.

Screen Time

Sometimes it's hard to face the fact that your child is in front of a screen too much because you are also glued to the television or computer. Talk with your child about what he thinks is a fair amount of time for electronic games and make a plan to keep each other accountable. "In short practice moderation (no more than two hours for all electronics total per day not counting homework) and monitor child's use of any gaming or internet connected system," says Gilboa. Remind your children there is nothing wrong with electronic games but that everyone needs to have balance in all areas of their lives.

Food Choices

Kids are smart and they know we all need to get more fruits and vegetables. If your

family's goal is to reduce sugary drinks or snacks, provide fruit to munch on and place veggies and a yummy



dip on the table for after school snacks. If you want your family to cut down on processed food snacks, don't bring the snack into the house.

Studies have repeatedly shown that meatless dishes are a healthy choice. A meatless dish once a week will not only help reach health goals, but can be easy on the family budget.

At non-meal times, challenge your kids to point out food commercials and discuss whether they showcase healthy or unhealthy food choices.

Make it a family affair to become healthier. Remember change is slow so take small steps and encourage your kids. Maybe they will be the ones to encourage you to get off the couch to go for a walk.






